## President's Corner

Spring is just around the corner and for the Village that means it is budget season. Each year as Village staff and the Village Board prepare the budget, we strive to align the budget with the Village's priorities and the core services we provide. For the past several years, the Village's number one priority has been the paving of streets. As a result of the successful 2016 road referendum, the Village was able to complete approximately \$8 million in paving over the past three years. Fortunately, the Village has been able to stretch the referendum dollars for a fourth year of paving. An additional seven blocks of roadway and two alleys will be paved this year. For the list of streets to be paved this year, please see page 4.

Each year, the Village is required to complete an audit of all its revenues and expenses for the prior fiscal year. Once again, I am proud to report that the Village was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). The

Village received this prestigious award as a result of our 2018 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management. This is a great accomplishment by the Village and a reflection of the professionalism and integrity of the organization. I greatly appreciate the work and dedication of all who were involved in the process.



The Village continues to see growth in our commercial areas. In 2017, the Village established two Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Districts and four Business Development Districts to encourage and support commercial redevelopment. These tools are already working for the Village and have been used to support the opening of Posto 31 (May 2018) and a new self-storage facility at 1201 Barnsdale (under construction). In addition to these TIF/BDD supported businesses, the Village also welcomed Bishop's Cuts/Color at Village Market (now open); Bangs Beauty Bar at 1016 E. 31st Street (opening soon); and Montessori Children's Community at 1905 E. 31st Street (under construction).

It is with both sadness and sincere gratitude that I announce the retirement of our Police Chief, Ed Rompa. Chief Rompa has served our community for over 20 years with a high level of compassion and dedication. I know that I personally will miss working with him and he will be missed by many in the community. I appreciate his service and leadership and wish him all the best in his retirement.

Please take a few moments to read through this spring's edition of the Rose Clippings. You'll find useful information on upcoming road construction, the new refuse and recycling program, Village events, and yard waste and brush collection. Please contact Village staff if you have any questions or concerns. ## What's New with the Village's Refuse & Recycling Program



- Service is provided by Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS).
- All single-family and two-family households receive refuse and recycling carts; residents have the option of using 35 gallon, 65 gallon or 95 gallon carts.
- Residents can mix and match cart sizes to meet household needs.
- Stickers are no longer used for standard weekly waste pick-up.
- Stickers may be used for extra garbage, yard waste, e-waste and bulk items.
- The minimum monthly service charge on resident water bills has been eliminated.
- The Village is now serviced on a three day schedule (Wednesday, Thursday or Friday).
- Curbside electronics recycling is now available on the first pick-up of each month.

### What do I do with extra Republic Services stickers?

Residents have two choices:

1. LRS will accept the current pink Republic Services stickers through the month of April on bulk items, electronics, extra refuse and yardwaste.
2. Residents may return or exchange current pink Republic Services stickers at Village Hall during regular business hours (M-F, 8:30 am until 5:00 pm) until April 12 at the current sale price (\$3.30 per sticker). To be eligible for a refund or exchange, stickers must be unused, whole, and have the backing intact. No refunds will be issued after April 12, 2019.

### What do I do with my blue recycle bin?

The Village recommends residents repurpose their blue recycling bins. If you do not want your blue bin, Lakeshore Recycling Systems will pick it up and recycle it. Just leave it at the curb on your pick up day with a note stating "please pick up."

### How do I recycle my electronics curbside?

Residents now have the convenience of recycling electronic waste at the curb on the first pick up day of each month. Stickers (\$3.00) are required for all electronic waste, as follows:

- 1 small item = 1 sticker
- Bundle of items = 5 stickers  
(in brown paper bag)
- Monitor/Television/Computer = 10 stickers



### Can I change my cart size?

Yes. Lakeshore Recycling Systems will allow residents to switch out their carts one time at no additional cost between April 1st and June 1st. Residents should contact LRS directly to make this request.

## Convenience Fees Start May 1st

**T**he Village accepts credit and debit card payments at Village Hall and online. Beginning May 1st, a 2.25% convenience fee (minimum \$1.00) will be added to all card transactions. This fee is collected by the payment processor and does not go to the Village. Payments may be made with cash or check to avoid this processing fee.

# Spring Storms

Spring is finally upon us, and with such comes additional threats from spring storms. The following are a few key points to remember related to spring weather

**Tornadoes** – The Village maintains two warning sirens that are designed for warning residents of tornado warnings while outdoors. When at home or inside buildings, the best options for being notified of severe weather are by purchasing a weather alert radio, staying tuned to local television or radio stations, or using weather warning apps designed for your smart phone. ***IF WE ARE UNDER A TORNADO WARNING, FIND SAFE SHELTER RIGHT AWAY, SUCH AS A SAFE ROOM, BASEMENT, OR SMALL INTERIOR ROOM ON THE LOWEST LEVEL.***

**Thunderstorms & Lightning** - Lightning is a leading cause of injury and death from weather-related hazards. Pay attention to weather alerts and keep an eye on the sky if attending outdoor events. ***IF WE ARE UNDER A THUNDERSTORM WARNING, IDENTIFY SAFE SHELTER RIGHT AWAY AND MOVE INDOORS TO A BUILDING OR CAR PRIOR TO THE STORM THREATENING.***

**Floods** - Floods are the most common natural disaster in the United States, and may develop slow or quickly. In La Grange Park, flooding usually occurs in yards and streets, especially at intersections. Just six inches of moving water can knock you down, and any amount of water can obstruct your view of trip hazards and holes. ***IF WE ARE UNDER A FLOOD WARNING, IDENTIFY SAFE SHELTER RIGHT AWAY, AND DO NOT WALK, SWIM OR DRIVE THROUGH FLOOD WATERS. STAY AWAY FROM ELECTRICAL HAZARDS SUCH AS STANDING IN A FLOODED BASEMENT, AND WHEN DRIVING, “TURN AROUND AND DON’T DROWN!”***

# Village Receives a Class 03/3X Rating from ISO

The Village was notified in March that it has received a Public Protection Classification of 03/3X by ISO. The rating stems from a re-evaluation of the Village by ISO which took place last November.

The ISO grading scale rates three distinct areas related to fire protection service in the Village: overall Fire Department (50%); Water Supply (40%); and Emergency Communications (10%). The scale used for the latest rating also allowed for an additional 5.50 points of credit for Community Risk Reduction (Public Fire Safety Education, Fire Prevention and Code Enforcement, and Fire Investigation).

Previous to March, ISO last issued a rating for our Village in November of 2012, where our Village improved from a long-standing classification of five, to a classification of three. Although we have maintained the same rating, our overall base score improved nearly five percentage points, up from a total of total of 70.45 points in 2012, to total of 75.34 points in 2019. Most of the increase was related to Fire Department efforts in Community Risk Reduction, and also improvements in Water Supply and Emergency Communications.

Although the results are good news for the Village, the process itself also proves very beneficial. Going through the survey process helps the Fire Department further identify strengths and weaknesses, while providing important information about where the Village can focus attention to further improve fire protection for our residents and businesses.

The updated 03/3X Classification formally takes effect June 1, 2019. Although not all insurance carriers utilize this information directly, many of them do, so it is recommended that all property owners, both residential and commercial, make sure that your insurance agents are aware of the rating. 

# Consolidated Dispatch Center Update

In December, our consolidated 9-1-1 Center (LTACC) welcomed its new Executive Director, Mike O'Connor. Mike came from the Libertyville Police Department with more than 20 years experience in public safety. In the next several months, LTACC will begin utilizing new technology to help locate cellular 9-1-1 callers more accurately, provide emergency medical instructions, and begin public education about 9-1-1.

This enhanced, centrally located dispatch center offers residents of La Grange, La Grange Park, and Western Springs quality services for Police, Fire, and Medical Dispatching 24 hours a day. Residents may still visit the Police window at Village Hall during normal business hours (8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.) for assistance with clerical matters. A red call box is located inside the main doors of Village Hall for 24 hour assistance.

## Water & Sewer Rates

The Village worked with a municipal consulting firm in 2017 to complete an analysis of the Village's water and sewer rates and of the systems' capital needs. The purpose of the study was to provide the Village with alternatives for setting water and sewer rates. The Village Board evaluated four rate alternatives and preferred the option which maintains current water and sewer infrastructure on a "pay as you go" basis. This option was preferred because it avoids increasing the Village's debt while maintaining a consistent water and sewer main replacement schedule. The Finance Committee reviewed the second year of proposed water and sewer rates during budget meetings held in March and the Village Board will consider increasing the rates in April. ## Drug Take Back

On Saturday, April 27th from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. the La Grange Park Police Department in coordination with the DEA will host a National Drug Take Back Day. This program offers a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposing of unwanted or expired medications (please note, only drugs in pill form will be accepted – no liquids, patches, needles, etc). Please empty all drugs from their original containers, bottles, or blister packs and place in a sealed baggie for drop off. ## 2019 Road Paving Projects

The Village will be completing nearly \$1.8 million in paving projects this year. The Village has awarded a contract to Nardulli, Inc to complete seven street segments listed below as well as two alleys. Both sections will be paved before school starts. Landscape restoration will follow paving and will be scheduled based on weather. Sod may be delayed to avoid extreme heat.

We ask that residents be extra cautious when driving through and around construction areas; be mindful of workers and equipment; and exercise patience when you experience delays or re-routing.

# 2019 Yard Waste & Brush Collection Program



## Yard Waste Program

This program is available through our waste hauler, Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS). LRS will accept yard waste with a sticker from April through early December. All containers and bundles should be at the curb by 6:00 a.m. on your pick-up day. A sticker must be affixed to each bag or bundle. If you use a can, please loop the sticker around one of its handles. Yard waste is collected either in heavy-duty paper bags or smaller garbage cans. To be used for yard waste, garbage cans must have two handles, be no larger than 35 gallons, and be marked for yard waste. The "Yard Waste" marking must be visible from the street. "Yard Waste" decals are available at Village Hall. Cans or bags should weigh no more than fifty pounds. Oversize cans are the largest cause of injury to garbage truck drivers. When you purchase a garbage can, please verify its size. Oversized cans will not be emptied.

LRS collects bundled brush along with other yard waste. Brush and branches must be securely bundled with bio-degradable twine or rope. Each bundle must be no more than four feet in length, two feet in diameter and weigh no more than fifty pounds. Individual branches must be no larger than three inches in diameter. A sticker must be affixed to each bundle. Please call the Village of La Grange Park at 354-0225 if you have any questions.

## Brush Collection Program

The Village offers a curbside brush collection program six times per year. Through the program, Village Public Works crews pick up tree branches and brush debris that are stacked in neat piles on the parkway. Brush must be at the curb by 7:00 a.m. Monday during the following weeks:

**May 6th • June 3th • July 1st • August 5th • September 2nd • October 7th (last pick up for the year)**

The Village will no longer be scheduling specific sections for pickup. Instead, multiple crews will be working concurrently across the Village during the collection week.

## Guidelines for the Brush Collection Program

- Brush must be stacked neatly on the parkway, piled no more than 4-feet high, with the butt end facing the curb. Please be sure that brush is not piled in such a way that interferes with motorist or pedestrian visibility.
- In narrow parkways, if brush extends onto the sidewalk, the brush may be piled parallel to the curb.
- Brush must be no longer than 6-feet in length and 4-inches in diameter.
- Logs must be cut into small, manageable pieces, and should be kept separate from brush.
- Stumps and root balls will not be picked up. They should be removed from trees or bushes.

Brush pickup is strictly for residents who have performed tree or brush work on their own property. If no evidence exists that work has been performed on the property, the Village reserves the right to charge the resident for this service. The brush will not be picked up until a check for payment of services is received, and our work schedule permits.

Contractors working for homeowners are not allowed to use this service, since we are not able to handle the quantity of brush that they produce. If evidence exists or contractors are seen by our Village workers placing tree or brush debris at the curb, the Village may charge the resident for removal of the tree/brush debris.

## Lottery for Free Mulch

For the past few years, the demand for mulch has far exceeded the mulch available. A lottery drawing will be held on May 1st, at which time names will be randomly drawn. After the drawing, the Public Works Department will be contacting residents to schedule mulch deliveries (with the first deliveries being made on Friday, May 3rd).

In order to be part of the lottery, please complete ONE of the following options prior to the drawing date of May 1st (phone calls will not be accepted):

- \* ½ truck load equals approximately 1.5 cubic yards
- 1 full truck load equals approximately 3 cubic yards (generally, one cubic yard will cover a 6-foot x 9-foot area)
